"Halley's Comet for Christmas" Public Star Party

The Westminster Astronomical Society, in cooperation with the Carroll County Parks & Recreation Department, shall present Halley's Comet to the public, on Saturday December 14. Lake Hashawa, north of Westminster, is the site of the star party. A map is enclosed with this issue. The club will have several telescopes set up to show the comet and other interesting celestial objects to the public and other club members that come. The more telescopes there are, the more objects we can observe simultaneously. A slide program shall also be presented on Halley's comet. We need volunteers to help fill these positions:

TELESCOPE OPERATORS (TO): Four to six telescopes shall be available for observing. One TO shall be required to man each instrument. The TO shall maintain the alignment of the telescope on the given object. The TO shall answer questions about the object being observed, or about his telescope. The TO should bring his own instrument or borrow one.

AUDIO VISUAL TECHNICIAN (AV Tech): Two AV Techs shall be needed to run the slide projector and tape recorder. The program soundtrack is on cassette and will need to be rewound between shows. The slide projector must be advanced manually. Although a one-man job, two are needed so that the equipment is never left unattended. The slide show will be represted several times during the evening.

<u>USHERS:</u> The ushers shall help guests find their way safely from the building in which they watch the slide show, to the location a short distance away where they will be able to view Halley's Comet. The ushers shall be armed with flashlights, preferably red light, to help preserve night vision. (Several layers of red cellophane may be attached to the flashlight with a rubber band.) Two to four ushers are needed.

It is not known how many people shall come to view the comet, although the number can be considerable. We need a good turnout of volunteers for several reasons. Some of the visitors may be interested in joining WAS, and it is important for them to know that we enjoy what we do and that we have fun doing it. If we make a favorable impression on the Parks Department, we may be asked to return periodically (e.g. twice a year) and support public viewing sessions. Perhaps we may be able to have some of our club star parties in state-owned areas.

If you have any questions, or wish to volunteer for any of the above mentioned positions, or have thought of something else you can do (such as making signs), call either Eugene Sterner (346-7725) or Curt Roelle (848-6384). Please volunteer even if it is only for an hour or so. Even if you cannot volunteer to help, come anyway. This may be your best and only chance to see Halley's Comet until 2061.

The public observing begins at 7:00 p.m. and ends at 11:00 p.m. Members are asked to come no later than 6:00 so that we can

get the projector/screen and telescopes set up. Hopefully, the club can watch the slide show once together before the public begins arriving.

1986 Astronomical League National Convention in Baltimore

Every year the Astronomical League (A.L.) holds a National Convention in a city which plays host to hundreds of guests from around the country. It is a very ambitious undertaking and few

clubs ever actually host a national convention. The Baltimore Astronomical Society (BAS) has offered to host the 1986 national convention, AstroCon 86, which will run from August 5-10. The convention shall be held at the College of Notre Dame. The early attendees will be able to go on tours of the National Air and Space Museum, NASA Goddard Space Flight Center, or observe with the historic 26" refractor at the U.S. Naval Observatory. The bulk of the convention will feature papers and other programs by noted amateur as well as professional astronomers.

As an added bonus, the Space Telescope is scheduled to be launched by the Space Shuttle during the convention. Since the Space Telescope Science Institute is in Baltimore, this should be one of the highlights of the convention. The Institute, located at the Johns Hopkins Campus, had planned to help underwrite the convention. Unfortunately, the Institute's agreement with the Association of Universities for Research in Astronomy (AURA) prohibits such ventures, and the convention was forced to move to Notre Dame. Notre Dame appears to be very satisfactory in meeting the needs of the convention. The Institute however, remains a major focal point of the convention.

WAS Observing Chairman and BAS member Mike Potter has assumed the awesome role of Convention Chairman. Mike writes the Observational Astronomy newsletter which is available free to WAS members, and was also the prime builder of the 17.5" telescope at Key Observatory. Several other ogranizations are planning to participate. These organizations are:

There shall be a Saturday night banquet as well as a reception at the Maryland Science Center, located at Baltimore's Inner Harbor.

If you would like to help in the planning of AstroCon 86, please indicate your intrest by calling one of the WAS members on the Planning Committee. This is your Astronomical League, and AstroCon 86 may be the best chance you may ever have to see one up close and to be directly involved. 


December Star Party



WAS T-Shirts & Logo Contest Continues


