#### Radio Astronomy at March 26 Meeting

Dr. Gary Karshner, radio astronomer and instructor at Gettysburg College, shall be guest lecturer at the March 26 Meeting of the Westminster Astronomical Society, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in Rm. 111 of the Lewis Science Hall, at Western Maryland College. In his talk Dr. Karshner will be discussing "Modern Radio Observational Techniques" using, for instance, the Very Large Array (VLA) radio telescope. Dr. Karshner started as an amateur astronomer in Northern California. Currently his chief research interest is "normal galaxies" and the relationship between galactic gas and dust in star formation.

This talk is the next in a series on the electromagnetic spectrum. In past meetings speakers from the U.S. Naval Research Laboratory and the Space Telescope Science Institute have discussed infrared and x-ray astronomy, respectively.

Dinner with Dr. Karshner shall begin at 6:00 p.m. on the night of the meeting at Fan's Chinese Restraunt, 59 W. Main Street. Reservations are unnecessary, but please come no later than 6:00.

# Messier Marathon Leaves Bitter Memories

The March 7-8 star party goes down in the WAS archives as

the coldest ever, so far. Temperatures that dropped to +2 degrees F. and gale winds made for a night in which Charles Messier himself probably would have said "to Hell with comets!", as he retired to a warm cozy fire inside.

Curt Roelle began observing alone at home at 7:00, plagued by wind gusts which kept knocking over the step ladder to his 12.5". Steve Rice and Robert Sier Jr. showed up at 10:30, Todd Bonner came at 2:30, and Joe Pekala brought new life at 5:00 in time to view P/Halley. A major highlight occurred when Steve and Bobby successfully located the southern globular cluster Omega Centauri, as it culminated only 3 degrees above the horizon.

At 4:00 the group took an hour break to warm up and watch astronomy videos before meeting Halley before dawn, which could be observed with the naked eye. In all six dozen Messier objects were observed before Scorpius and Sagittarius rose, but it was too depressing to continue after 9 hours outside in that weather with those summer constellations lolling about.

## April Star Party

Mike Scalion hosts a star party every month on the Saturday nearest New Moon. Often in months such as this, when New Moon occurs mid-week (April 9), he has star parties on both the preceding and following Saturdays, which would be April 5th and 12th. Since we are joining mid-year, new subscribers shall pay only \$8 for the May-December Astronomy. Current subscribers need to pay \$1 per issue to extend their subscriptions through the December following the expiration date. After this the club subscribes as a group one year at a time.

#### Hatter Planetarium


