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Dr. Lufkin To Wrap Up Halley's Comet at May 28 Meeting

Dr. Daniel H. Lufkin, of Hood College in Frederick, shall present a "Comet Halley Wrapup" at the May 28 meeting. He will discuss some of the early findings from the current apparition as Halley continues to fade in our telescopes.

The May meeting is not being held at the usual location. The meeting begins at 8:00 p.m., at the Hashawa Environmental Center, north of Westminster (see map). Dinner with Dr. Lufkin shall be at Fan's Chinese Restraunt, 59 W. Main Street, promptly at 6:00 p.m. Reservations are not necessary and all are invited to attend. For those who wish to bring telescopes, there shall be an opportunity to observe after the meeting from the park.

To get to Hashawa from Westminster, take Rt. 97 north to John Owings Road. Turn right and follow the signs to Hashawa, which is past the county landfill, on the left.



Telescopes were provided by Kenneth & Janet Flynn, Blaine & Frank Roelke, and Curt Roelle. Joe Pekala ran the slide program and sold comet books. We want to thank the Baltimore Astronomical Society for again loaning us their slide program.

As on December 14, May 4 was a beautiful clear night at Hashawa, only warmer and more tolerable. Because of Daylight Savings Time it was not dark until nearly 10:00. Bill Shuey brought his 10" Meade Schmidt-Cassegrain and Mike Scalion brought a 10" Newtonian. Kenneth and Janet Flynn brought their excellent 3" Celestron refractor and Curt Roelle brought a 4" Schmidt-Cassegrain. Once agin Joe Pekala manned the slide projector, while Eugene Sterner helped keep order in the ranks.

The 1986 Carroll County Astronomy Day went without a hitch at the Main Library Branch. Eugene Sterner coordinated the event and displayed models of space vehicles, a bulletin board of information about the Challenger tragedy, and some new videotapes. Kenneth Flynn brought his astrophotographs and set up his 3" refractor. Bill Shuey put his massive 10" Meade Schmidt-Cassegrain on display.
